#### 1969 Review - Clifford J. Hanson

The 1969 season was very successful - not as big as 1968 but a much smoother operation. The attendance: 214 crews with 2715 total people; 52 crews with 614 people from Region Ten and all fifteen Region Ten Councils participating.

There were no major accidents or illnesses in 1969. No one spent a night in the hospital in Ely - a record for over 14 years. Most of the accidents were cut feet and shins on the rocks.

The success of the season again was largely due to the very fine staff working together for the improvement and benefit of the Base and the crews who participated.

We are sorry to lose Ron Walls, Assistant Base Director. He has served since 1955 in many capacities. He has completed law school and has passed the Bar Exam and has set up practice in Ely. We are very appreciative of the fact that congenial Clyde "Sandy" Bridges will be with us again. He serves as Assistant Base Director, specifically directing the trail operation at the Base.

#### RANGER HOME - William R. Lowe and Clyde S. Bridges

The story of completing the Ranger Home was told by William Lowe. He stated that we would be well under the \$20,000 total as approved and budgeted by this committee last year. Pictures of the exterior were displayed by Sandy Bridges. He also described the interior and the work completed to date.

#### " LES VOYAGEURS" - John Budd

The cost and financing of the new Canoe Base movie was explained by John Budd. story of the filming and production was told by Clifford Hanson. It appears to be a very fine film. When the final print is made, it will be about 25 minutes long. Mr. Budd stated he was pleased with the information about the film and the money raised to date but we still need about \$2,000. plus the money for the copies of the film.

#### ADDITIONS 1969 - C. Sandy Bridges

The new red guide packs were displayed by Sandy. He explained the new foods for the trail including meats, vegetables and cake mixes and how much they improve the trail menus. He also explained our experiment with the new lightweight, rip-stop nylon tents and tarps from the National Camping Service; the help and value of the new 14 foot aluminum boat and 20 horsepower motor for emergencies and for taking the fishing licenses to Prairie Portage.

## SUGGESTIONS AND PLANS FOR 1970 - Clifford J. Hanson

The suggested plans for a new drying building; map and chart building which would include a photo lab were presented by Clifford Hanson. He showed suggested drawings. The old (small) sauna building will be torn down as it is rotted around the bottom of the sauna room and the building is becoming an "eye-sore". A new 10' x 14' building should be built to house the latrine facilities of the old sauna. Additional work needs to be done for ventilation in the Guide locker room and new lockers and arrangements in the other staff locker area.

#### SANITATION SYSTEM - Edward B. Chapin

The sanitation system was working very well this summer. The duckweed and algae has covered the lagoon. We were concerned and the U.S. Forest Service inspected it. They said this would not interfere with the processes of the lagoon but recommended that the drain pipe from the aerator be extended to the middle of the lagoon and a pipe or tube with air bubbling out the end be placed in the lagoon. It could be fastened directly to the new drain pipe. This would keep a small area open at the middle of the lagoon and help keep the water agitated.

January 9, 1970 was selected as the date for the regular winter meeting.

Meeting adjourned.

#### 1969 SUMMARY

#### I <u>ATTENDANCE</u>

1969 was another great season with a total attendance of 2915 Explorers, Scouts, Staff and Guests.

All fifteen Region Ten Councils had crews participating, the first time in six years. We had a total of 52 crews; 538 Scouts and Explorers; 76 Advisors - for a total of 614 participating.

There were 162 crews from other Regions with 1649 Scouts and Explorers, 268 Advisors for a total of 1917.

We had 122 Staff members and 44 overnight visitors in addition to the above Scouts, Explorers and Advisors.

A grand total of 91 Councils from 11 Regions and 36 States participated during the 1969 season.

#### II STAFF

Our Staff continues to give the crews a true understanding of the wilderness and an experience to remember. This is the goal of every Staff man, whether he served as a guide or on the Base Staff.

We had 122 men on our Staff; 91 full time and 31 served only as Swampers. Fifty-one of the Staff were from twelve of the fifteen Councils in Region Ten. Twenty-eight States were represented by the Staff.

Clyde "Sandy" Bridges, Assistant Base Director, continued to be in charge of all trail operations and training. The six Voyageur Chiefs were responsible for guide training as well as the crews on his shift.

The Swamper Training Program was conducted by Blaine "Butch" Diesslin and was the best we have ever had. The "in Base" training was followed by the actual practice "on the trails" program and prepared the Swampers much better than in the past.

We were also very proud of the fine Waterfront Program this year, under the leadership of Hayden "Tink" Groth which emphasized safety instruction and included the wearing of the life jacket for at least a mile or more from the Base. The congenial "send off" and "welcome back" to each of the crews was an excellent moral and spirit builder this year.

Training continues to be emphasized for all of the Staff. Myron Chase of Red Wing again came to the Base and conducted an excellent course in "Living off the Land". The U.S. Forest Service and others were brought in to aid in special training. The smorgasbord again was the "highlight" of the training program.

#### III ADDITIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS

Last year we improved and remodeled the waterfront and it continued to be a credit to the Canoe Base. It has settled into the wilderness very nicely. The canoe storage on the hill has worked out fine and in spite of a "last" portage or two when the returning Explorers take the canoe back up the hill.

A new 20 H.P. Johnson outboard motor was purchased.

A new Smoker Craft-Marlin - 16 foot aluminum boat was purchased for emergency use and transportation to Prairie Portage with the fishing licenses etc.

New screen doors and screening were put on the front of the thirty-nine tents in "Tent City". A wonderful improvement.

The parking lot was improved both for the crews and the staff. In 1970 we will be able to use still more of the parking area that was graveled this past year. The gravel will have worked into the ground and not be as soft as it was this past summer.

Paths around the Base were improved with gravel, rock and logs.

Several of the buildings were scraped and varnished.

Three new tents and platforms were added to "Tent City".

Three new staff tents were put in the kitchen staff tent area.

A roof covering was mounted on log posts to help keep the rain off of the wood for the sauna stove. The staff nicknamed it the "Pagoda". The roof came from the pump building on the waterfront that was removed last summer.

Ten new Grumman Aluminum canoes were added to the fleet again this summer. They were purchased from the National Supply Service.

Five Seliga canoes were also added. The Seliga canoe continues to be the favorite of the staff.

Some pots, pans and a special food cart were purchased for the kitchen.

Three desks, 1 walnut and 2 metal: three desk chairs, three metal files, a book case and a typing table were purchased reasonably from the Region Ten office when it was remodeled.

An adding machine was given to the Base by Maggie Starr.

Fifty folding steel cots were purchased for staff and tent city.

Sixteen army folding cots were purchased to be used as "fill in" when more than twelve per crew arrive at the Base.

A different style paddle was purchased from Smoker Company through the Supply Service and seemed to be a better shape and quality.

#### Summary cont - (3)

Eight 'first mate' chairs were purchased. Four for the new Ranger Home and four for the Director's cabin.

An electric fireplace was purchased for the office along with six of the first mate chairs from the Mrs. Harris memorial fund.

Six large chairs and a clock were given to the Base by the Great Northern Rail-road.

A refrigerator was given to the Base by Kathryn Marquardt.

A new fold-out daveno bed was purchased for the Director's cabin.

A new style and size pack was purchased for the guides to use as a personal pack. Sandy Bridges helped to design this pack. It is a red, pliable, impregnated plastic that is waterproof. A real favorite of the guides.

Many more books were added to the Robert Hedrick library.

A snowblower was given to the Base by Averill Kronick.

Our wonderful friend, Walter Wallace, sold his summer home on Moose Lake (the red one near the Base) and when he left he gave the Canoe Base so many things it is difficult to numerate them. There were 82 items on a list with many of them in pairs and in sets of 30 or 40 with a total value of over \$3500.00.

The gift included such items as 10 H.P. outboard motor; 16 foot boat with trailer; 2 fiberglas floats for the barge; fire pump and 200 feet of linen hose; band saw and ten spare blades; radial arm saw with seven attachments; chain saw and tools; power yard "tool" with motor, grass blades and bulldozer blades; 40 books and for Sandy's home - a Zenith combination stereo with AM/FM radio with 30 records; floor lamps and two sets of lawn furniture.

Mr. Wallace's home is in Indiana. We are going to miss him. He has given us many things in the past including the large floating barge we call "Cleopatra".

#### IV PROGRAM CHANGES AND IMPROVEMENT

The waterfront program and facilities was greatly improved. The system for swamping the canoes and the swimming tests was run very well. All members of every crew, including all the boys, advisors and guides wear life jackets for a mile or more from the Base on the first day to become acquainted with the use and how to put the life jacket on before an emergency.

Several new foods were used on the trail including chicken, beef and pork instead of the Argentine corned beef. New dehydrated vegetables; bacon in concentrated form as well as canned and in slab were used. Several food items were pre-packed before the crews arrived at the Base and several trail foods were heat sealed in plastic bags. These items were all of the "specific quanity per crew" foods and would not be changed by crew size.

We did some experimental work with new "rip-stop nylon" tents and tarps supplied by the National Camping Service at no cost to us. They are much lighter weight and have some changes in construction and were very well received by both staff and crew.

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#### Summary cont - (4)

#### V <u>NEW RANGER HOME</u>

The new Ranger Home has been completed except for the reception room in the basement and some of the furnishings. Albert Koval Construction Company did the major structural and frame work. Our staff put up the wall paneling, ceiling tiles, electric work and plumbing fixtures. All the work has been inspected and approved by the electric and plumbing inspector in Ely. The beautiful carpeting in all the rooms was put in in August. The kitchen cabinets, sink, stove, refrigerator and hood were installed in July. The household furniture was in place by September. Sandy's mother made the draperies for the home.

Water from the drilled well by the dining hall and the septic tank and aerator were in operation in September. Everyone is very pleased and happy - especially Sandy Bridges.

#### VI <u>LES VOYAGEURS</u>

An excellent new 25 minute movie of the Charles L. Sommers Wilderness Canoe Base trail program was produced by the Empire Photosound Inc. of Minneapolis. The cost was \$25,000.00, the money was raised by Mr. John Budd, chairman of the Film Production Committee.

The Canoe Base Staff assisted in the production of the movie by serving in many capacities. Portaging; paddling, background, and as members of the cast etc. Mr. John Nemanich of Long Prairie, Minnesota and his Explorer Post were selected as the lead members of the cast. Charles Garriott of Kansas City, Kansas was picked as the representative guide. Three negro Explorers from Minneapolis participated as members of the background cast. The filming was done during July at the Base and on the trail.

The premier showing was held at the Great Northern-Northern Pacific Railroad theater on November 22, 1969.

We have borrowed the \$6200.00 needed to purchase 50 prints of the film. These prints are available for purchase by the local councils at \$125.00 each. We are encouraging the Region Ten Councils to purchase their own film.

#### VII FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION

A HUGE CAKE was baked by our Staff. The GRAND-DADDY of them all---five feet high and six tiers tall. Each tier was built onto a six high- 8 x 8 inch cake - for a total of 366 cakes - 150 pounds of red, white and blue frosting and the cake was varied colors also----and ALL EATEN IN FIVE (5) DAYS??!!

## 1968 REVIEW - Clifford J. Hanson

The book containing the 1968 information on attendance, activities and accomplishments was summarized. 3636 Explorers, Senior Scouts, Advisors, Staff and Guests in 298 crews made this the all time high in attendance - both individual participants and crews.

1968 FINANCE REVIEW - Henry W. Schreiber The report was based on Region Ten figures, these will be reconciled with the National final figures when they arrive about February 15. Fee receipts - \$144,500.00; Trading Post - \$33,800.00; Capital -\$10,700.00. The operating expenditures are \$123,300.00; Trading Post -\$26,700.00; and Capitol \$11.500.00. Accounts payable about \$3,000.00.

It was suggested that the words Profit and Loss be removed from the Finance Analysis sheet and replaced by - "Over or Under anticipated income."

Discussion included needs at the Base, monies spent in Canada and the items included in the budget.

# 1969 OUTLOOK - Clifford J. Hanson

The reservations on January 1 are as good as last year - January 1. We do not intend to operate with 12 or 13 crews a day in 1969. We will register enough to have about 10 or 11 crews per starting date. We do not anticipate a shortage of crews.

The staff will be younger this year due to Uncle Sam and college courses plus the ol' timers graduating. We are in need of an assistant cook and maintenance men. Young staff applications are heavy this year. Allan Reishus was appointed Assistant Base Director.

#### PROJECT REPORTS

Ranger Home - William R. Lowe
The excavation and basement walls are completed and the basement floor
will be poured when the building covers it. The studdings and floor
joists are being put up now. The rain and heavy snow has slowed the
work to-date. The last of February most of the interior paneling
should be done. "We are within the budget and have a darn nice house".

\$13,500 is the present construction cost of the house but added are excavation costs; water and sewage. The well at the water tank will be used with about 180 feet of special piping. Sandy Bridges has put in the areator tank and from that connected to the regular sewer system. \$20,000 has been authorized and this will include electric heat, carpeting, fixtures, plumbing and furniture.

Ranger Report - Clyde S. Bridges
The water and sewer projects that are completed was explained. Snow has been a real problem; the road has been kept open; snowmobile transportation is a problem due to the deep snow; the snow on the roofs of the buildings has been kept shoveled off and the buildingshave survived; a gas heater was given to Sandy and used in the cabin for a real improvement in comfort; many visitors in spite of the snow.

Safety Program - Clyde S. Bridges
The Safety Program for 1969 includes the review of several possibilities pertaining to the "call for help on the trails".

- (a) The possible use of signal flares and smoke flares was explained. Some samples have been tested. They have the full approval of the local men of the Canadian Rangers and the U.S. Forest Service but the higher officials have not been approached by us at the present time.
- (b) Radio communications have been discussed with local Canadian and U.S. Forest Service men who approve of this program but it has not gone beyond them. The possibility of radios located at firetowers etc. was explained. He pointed out that a short wave radio made by Johnson Company of Waseca, Minnesota was the one that the Canadian Rangers use at a cost of \$185.00 plus \$40.00 to \$60.00 for antenna, depending upon size and height.
- (c) First aid kits proved very helpful and were very well accepted last summer. They will be continued.
- (d) Randy Kits will also be continued the new ones developed for last summer.

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(e) The First Aid Course in Denver was attended by Sandy Bridges and was aimed at exactly the kind of potential problems we have at the Base and on the trails. An excellent course and will be very helpful to Staff and the Base.

1969 New Trail Items - Clyde S. Bridges
New food items are being investigated as well as some already selected
to be added for 1969. These items will be light in weight, more nutritious - some even cheaper than the foods they replace. In 1968 we
used a new noon meal supplement called Hudson Bay Bread - some enriched cookied (hard tack bread) - some extra fortified candy and other
experimental foods, most of them very good.

We also experimented with a vinyl waterproof pack. It was so well accepted by the Staff that we plan to supply one for each guide in 1969.

SPECIAL NEEDS IN 1969 - Ronald W. Walls
The items as listed in the 1968 summary book for the 1969 budget were
quickly reviewed and their need explained. Several items on the
"Additional Needs Not in the Budget" items were pointed out as being
as important as many of the budgeted items. These included the
definite replacement of 550 feet of 2" black pipe in the main water
lines; a water pipeline to the parking lot; the real need of at least
10 Indian Fire Pumps; vent fan in the Staff locker room; chairs in
the reception office and the staff accommodations both the sleeping
and locker areas. Discussion followed each suggestion. Robert D.
Banks appointed Ron Walls, Sandy Bridges and Cliff Hanson as a "committee" to come up with ideas and suggestions for improving the guide
locker room.

It was moved that up to \$3200. be used for the above projects by John Budd - seconded by Luther Ford - carried.

MOVIE OF THE CANOE BASE - Henry W. Schreiber
It was explained that the old movies now being used to promote the
Canoe Base were not of the Base but on a canoe expedition. We need
one of our Base.

Four years ago we were granted a gift of \$5,000. from a foundation toward a film of our Base that is still being held for us. It was pointed out that our need was three fold: (1) to promote the Base, (2) to inform the young men, advisors and their parents about the Base and (3) to be used as entertaining information for civic or service clubs and T.V. showings. General discussion followed on needs, uses and questions answered.

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John Budd offered to make some additional contacts for money to make this proposed film. \$25,000. was the former quoted price and it was recommended that we continue with the same company.

Still pictures, color and black and white to be made also.

1969 BUDGET - Robert D. Banks
The proposed 1969 budget of a total of \$184,700.00 based on 275 crews
was presented, reviewed and approved. John Budd made the motion for
approval - seconded by Luther Ford - carried.

The "Special and Additional Needs" were again reviewed and William Lowe moved - seconded by Luther Ford, 'that the total expenditures for these items be \$4,000. instead of \$3,200. exclusive of the movie but to include a new fold-out bed davenport for the Director's cabin. Motion carried.

## HI ADVENTURE PROJECT - Robert D. Banks

The National request for "Hi-Adventure" possibilities was reviewed.

- (a) Big Sky Country William Lowe
  Several relief maps of a proposed area was used by William Lowe to
  show where this back packing, hiking, horseback riding and pack train
  program could be conducted. The area is basically along the Montana
  and Wyoming borders, between Red Lodge and Cook City in Montana down
  into Wyoming to Yellowstone National Park. This is beautiful, high,
  rugged mountain country with Granite Peak, 12,799 ft. elevation, highest mountain in Montana in the center of the area. Groups could start
  from a central point, hike out in circles and return to the base camp
  or into areas to be picked up by bus. It is all National Forest land,
  surrounded by private property. A part of a film taken by an Explorer
  Post in this area was shown.
- (b) Dakota 01' West Country Robert B. Lamont
  Maps and pictures were shown of the area with a group on the trails.
  This area starting in the "Teddy Rossevelt" country to a man-made lake on the Missouri River. "History and the Plains", covered wagon, hiking, pack train or combination of these would be the interest focus. There would be help for this program from people in the area. A sheet with ideas and explanation was distributed. Discussion followed ideas as geological camps, etc.
- (c) Science and Conservation Projects Donald B. Shank
  The setting up of many types of projects and activities in connection
  with Universities, conservationists, Forest Service and businesses.
  Examples: the work witht the group now working near Ely on wolf study
  and many special study groups throughout the country; the work with

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Conservation Departments, studies of fish, water, animals etc. It was also suggested that some programs could be developed with State and National Historical Socities for studies.

## NEW LOOK IN CAMPING COMMITTEE - Paul R. Christen

The need to develop a greater interest and desire to meet the needs for better and possibly bigger camps to handle the Boy Power '76 program was pointed out. One way would be to help the Council Camping Committees by encouraging the improvement in camp properties, program and facilities and become acquainted with the other camps in Region Ten. The "chairman" of this group to be a member of the present Region Ten Camping Committee. Kenneth G. Pringle has been appointed Chairman of this Committee.

JAMBOREE - Henry W. Schreiber The Committee was urged to visit the National Jamboree at Farragut, Idaho this summer..July 16-22.

John Budd and John Parish are on the Jamboree Committee. The Region is planning to have a 'plane load' go out - visit overnight and return the next day. The Camping Committee is urged to make use of this opportunity.

Each Committeeman was presented with a ceramic tile with the Canoe Base emblem on it.
