

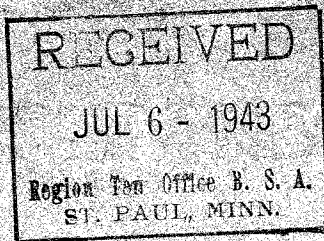

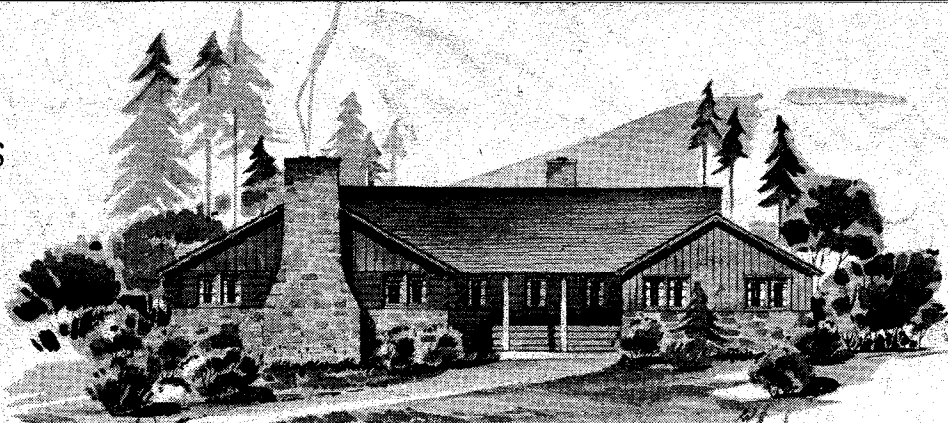
First day on trail
We had a late start today, but the distance was not far so that we could make it easily. Our objective for today was Lake Isabella. About three thirty we pulled into campsite at Isabella. During the day we made good time and ate lunch in North bay of Sassawood Lake. Everyone had fun kidding each

canoes over portages was
difficult for everyone at first.
Soon the guide was praising
our efforts. The scenery was
exceedingly beautiful now
that we were in Pugeto
park. We had swell meals
today. Your appetite expands

for the whole trip.

Second day on trail

Last night there was a

thore worth and everyone

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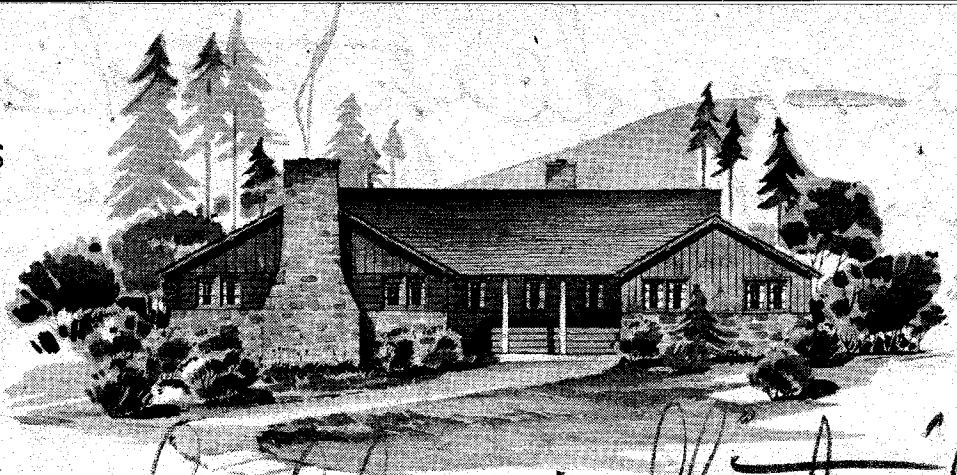
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Stayed dry. Today we

Kashaping was the scene of our lunch. Whaba magnificent scene it was. Sparkling sun drenched waters. A pure sky flecked with massive fluffy white clouds. It was tough day and everyone was tired. After supper there was a general rush for beds. Guide says we'll have an easy day tomorrow.

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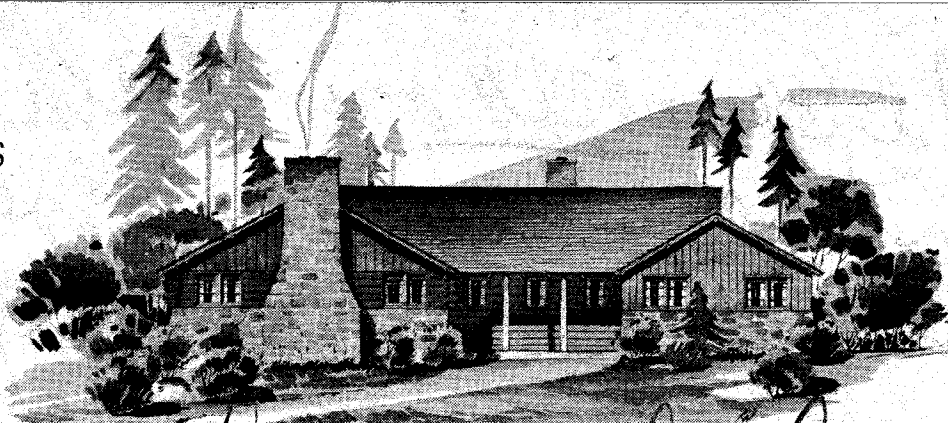
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Third day on the trail

to night. The guide

rugged country that
lay ahead. Supper

Williams Lake to Agnes

we made it through without
mishap. In Agnes we looked over
a Canadian Ranger stop over
cabin. The guide explained
about how anyone could use them
if in need. After lunch we
visited the Indian graves
which proved quite interesting.
We camped about 5:00 o'clock.
It is exactly the same kind of
weather we had on Kashapiuk.
Just before camping we saw an
otter. This was an eventful day.

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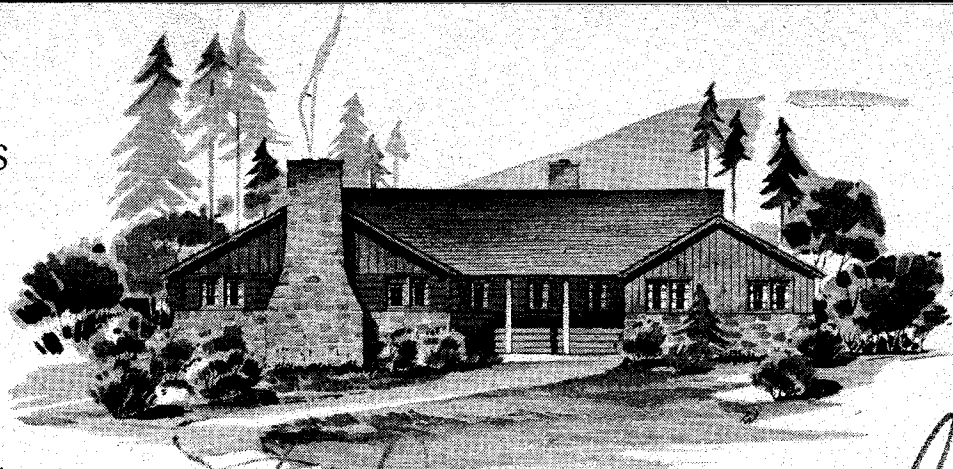
Fourth day on trail
