Log of Canoe Trip

Sunday, day of arrival — We were welcomed at Hibbard's lodge by a guide who handed us welcome and instruction sheets and also informed us of the lodge's surrounding territory. We made our beds and then built our fire and had lunch. In the afternoon, we went climbing and picked blueberries. We climbed to Inspiration Point, where we viewed miles and miles of the territory. That evening we had a council, which including the introduction of canoe songs and also the private or personal introduction of each boy by himself. After that we prepared for bed and retired at 8 o'clock.

Monday, day of departure — That morning everything was a bustle. One by one, the individual parties made up the preceding days, checked out after the boys had been issued paddles, knapbacks, and ground cloth. We went north on Moose Lake, portaged one-fourth of a mile onto Lake Ensign and travelled approximately in a southwest direction. After portaging three times around Lake Ensign, distances of about one-fourth of a mile each, we entered Lake Ime, travelling almost due north. That night we camped on the southern side of Lake Ime.

Tuesday, second day out — That day we stayed over at Lake Ime. We went fishing and picking blueberries and raspberries in the morning, and in the afternoon we went sailing on Ime and picked our dinner's desert of blueberries.

Wednesday, third day out — We travelled south, portaging one-third of a mile from Lake Ime to Thomas Lake. We travelled through Thomas Lake, portaged a hundred yards from Thomas into Tracer Lake and went north.

across Traser Lake. Travelling north-east from Traser Lake, we had three portages, each about a fourth of a mile, leading into Lake Hebekahic. At noon we stopped, ate lunch, and set up our camp. That afternoon we went down Lake Hebekahic about two miles, visited the rangers tower, and returned to our camp for the night.

Thursday, fourth day out — Still travelling in a north-east direction, we left Hebekahic Lake and portaged four times into K-nife Lake and down K-nife Lake due south. We went over several rapids in entering Melon Lake. We camped on a stream connecting Melon Lake and Birch Lake. We were right across the stream from Canada and so we went over and walked around on it.

Friday, fifth day out — We went south, left Melon Lake, entered Birch Lake, came down through Sucker Lake, travelled through all of Newfoundland Lake and most of Moose Lake, camping on an island in Moose Lake directly across from the lodge. We ended up the day with fifteen miles travelled and not one portage.

Saturday, last day out — That morning we paddled across to the lodge and took our canoes up to the rack, checked in our packs, paddles, and ground cloths. We also received our maps of the canoe trails and our emblems of the trip. We then checked out and left for home.
